



S.S. Seward Students Attend Journalism Field Trip

On January 17th, a group of students from S.S. Seward's Newspaper and Literary Magazine Clubs, as well as Mrs. Moon's journalism class, got the opportunity to visit the Orange County Government Center and Straus News to learn more about the journalism industry. At the Orange County Government Center in Goshen, students heard from Amanda Dana, the Orange County Director of Tourism and Film, about working with travel journalists to promote

Orange County. Students were able to ask questions about tourism, travel journalism, and how some of the speakers there chose their careers. Another speaker, Hank Gross, a local news reporter for Mid-Hudson News who has worked in TV, newspaper, and radio journalism for over fifty years, gave some insights into the journalism industry and how it has changed. When asked to describe what a typical day as a journalist is like, he told the students, "One of the beauties of journalism is that no two days are alike."

Before the students departed, they were encouraged to follow and support Pick OCNY, which Amanda Dana and her team use to bring more attention to Orange County, as well as Mid-Hudson News, of which Hank Gross is the founder.

After leaving the Government Center, students visited Straus News in Chester to hear

from more journalists and learn about the process of putting together a newspaper.

Students were welcomed by Molly Caulken, Lisa Reider, and Jeanne Straus, who write, edit, and publish for Straus News. Students were then able to ask questions about the field of journalism. Molly Caulken affirmed Hank's claim that



no two days are alike when working in journalism, and described various tasks she often performed as part of her job, including attending local events and utilizing social media platforms. When asked what advice they would give to aspiring journalists, Lisa Reider

responded that it's best to go into the writing process of an article with the knowledge that everything is more complicated than one may think, and to be aware of one's own biases. Jeanne Straus, who's been working in the field for over thirty-five years, advised that reporters should always ask open-ended questions.

After answering questions, the journalists turned the interview around and asked some questions to the visiting students! Students were able to share their thoughts on



what it's like being a teen today, as well as current issues like AI and cell phone usage in school. Afterwards, the students were shown around the building and had the opportunity to see some behind the scenes action of how a newspaper is put together.

BIO: S.S. Seward's very own Mr. Visconti is a dedicated guitarist and founding member of a brand new rock band based in New York called The Yagas. Having already amassed several thousands of followers across social media in just a few months, The Yagas have immense potential that we're only just beginning to witness.

I asked Mr. Visconti if he could tell me a little bit about how this group came to be. Here's what he had to say:

"We all met as parents at The Rock Academy in Woodstock. Our kids were students there. Renn [Hawkey], Vera [Farmiga], and I carpooled. Then we all participated in the Adult Program. Renn, Vera, and I started writing together and then Jason [Bowman] and Mike [Davis] joined the fold. Our first album "Midnight Minuet" will be out in March, and our second single will drop in January. Our first single "The Crying Room" is available on all streaming platforms and the song's video is on YouTube (over 1.1 Million views so far)."

Mr. Visconti also mentioned that the people who mastered and mixed The Yagas' music have both been nominated for GRAMMYs in the past, with one of them even winning one. The members of this group are also affiliated with other well-known rock bands, including The Red Hot Chili Peppers, Deadsy, Coldplay, Beck, Deftones, and 30 Seconds to Mars. The band got their name from the Slavic witch Baba Yaga. **MY REVIEW:** It doesn't look like The Yagas have performed live yet, so I couldn't give you a personal concert review. However, I do happen to be one of the 1.1 Million people on YouTube who's seen the music video for their debut song "The Crying Room," and I can confirm that this song is nothing short of incredible. It's spooky, dark, and mysterious, with incredible vocals and a very unique instrumental. The video is extremely captivating, with beautiful cinematography and a lot of great acting from the lead singer, Vera Farmiga, who also happens to be a famous actress. But when you see Mr. Visconti, you'll be like, "Oh my God, I know that guy!" which was the best part for me. The whole song and video were very well done though, and I'm very excited for more new content from this band.




